Brede Parish Council Notes from the Chair

I'd like to introduce three people who offered to serve this community through the Parish Council and who have been co-opted since the last Newsletter.

In October we welcomed Mike Duffield. Mike worked for HMRC for 40 years, rising to a senior level, managing over 300 people at three locations. He is trained in accountancy and project management. In the voluntary sector, he has worked with the Prince's Trust and a local charity called Hands, that teaches life skills to adults with learning difficulties. Recently retired, he moved to Cackle Street two years ago.

Then Dan McDonald applied to join the Council in November. Dan served in the army, and then ran his own business for many years. He is a trustee and director of a charity for homeless ex-service people and a presenter on community radio networks across the UK and Europe. Dan has his own mobility challenges, and no doubt will bring that important perspective to the Council. He now lives in Ostler's Field, Broad Oak.

Mark Chamberlain introduced himself at the January meeting. He works at the Conquest Hospital, where he was Matron of a frailty ward before becoming an Electronic Patient Record Lead Nurse. He has skills in training, project, team and budgetary management. Mark has taken a lead in various initiatives, including the hospital's Courtyard Project, which brought him into contact with community organisations. Mark lives in Furnace Lane, Broad Oak.

All three firmly believe that residents should be able to influence what happens in their local community. They each bring their expertise and life experience, along with a determination to move the Parish of Brede forward. As Dan wrote in his application, "All I can offer is my time, commitment and energy to make our community a welcoming, safe and happy place to live." And from Mark, "The Parish has preserved and developed its community services and groups through the work and dedication of the local population and the Parish Council. I want to be an active participant." We are lucky to have them on the Council.

Finally, I'd like to draw your attention to the annual Parish Assembly, which will be held on 8th May at 7.30pm in Brede Village Hall. Do join us to hear about the Council's work in the past year and to participate in questions and discussion. Further details are on page 6.

Update on recent Council works and projects

Recreation Ground Play Equipment

The basket swing finally returned before Christmas, thanks to a new top beam being fitted under warranty. We hope it will be enjoyed as the weather improves.

Tree Works and Hedge Works

The tree report was completed in November and showed few concerns. There will be some minor works taking place on the recreation ground during March; removal of deadwood and branches over the play area and bus stops, plus the yearly cut back of the boundary hedge. Please avoid the play areas while the work is being done. This should take no more than a couple of dry days.

Traffic Feasibility Study

The Parish Council requested a feasibility study by East Sussex Highways, to look at ways and costs to reduce speeds, improve safety and make the parish safer for residents. This was requested in October and takes around four months to be prepared. Council will look at the report when it is received and consider the recommendations and cost implications.

Telephone Box in Cackle Street

No volunteers came forward to renovate this phone box and run it as community space, so the Parish Council will now look at selling it. To try and keep it within the parish, interested residents are invited to contact the Parish Clerk with any offers to purchase it. Buyers will be responsible for moving costs and arrangements.

Graffiti in the Parish

Unfortunately, during the Christmas festivities, there was a spate of graffiti in the parish, particularly around Broad Oak: bus stops, telecoms cabinets, road signs and the play equipment were all affected. The bus stop in Udimore Road has been the worst casualty and due to the type of paint used, it cannot be removed. The whole bus shelter must now be considered for redecoration, which unfortunately will have to come out of the precept paid by you the residents.

Community Speedwatch



To All Broad Oak / Brede Parishioners

Within our small rural parish there are two main roads, the A28 going south to north through Brede, Cackle Street and Broad Oak and on towards Northiam, and the B2089 from Cripps Corner to Rye. These roads are used by many people, both locals and commuters, and considerable numbers do not keep to the 30 mph speed limits

The current volunteers of the Broad Oak / Brede Community Speedwatch Group work hard to provide a presence and record those who are exceeding the speed limit but, without more volunteers, the group is struggling to do as many sessions as required to help change behaviours of road users.

Full training is given, so if you can spare a few hours a month and would like to try and help make the parish safer for all who live in it, please do consider volunteering. In the past 12 months, Community Speed Watch groups throughout Rother have,

- Recruited 217 volunteers
- Completed 4057 roadside sessions.
- Given 9514 voluntary hours
- Generated 48,320 reports of speeding, of which 3041 were classed as excessive (50% above the limit).

In the sessions we were able to run, our local group recorded 374 vehicles ovet the speed limit on the A28 alone.

Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a **national initiative where, in partnership with** the police, members of communities use detection devices to monitor local **vehicle speeds**. The volunteers report drivers exceeding the speed limit to the police with the aim of educating drivers to slow down.

With your help, these numbers can increase further, and our roads made safer for everyone.

The Roles and Responsibilities of a Parish Council

Most of you are aware that the Parish Council is the first tier of Local Government, but do you know exactly what it does, and the roles and responsibilities within it? Here is a short summary.

The Council

The Council as a whole is a corporate body which acts as the local authority for the parish. Its the tier of government nearest to the electorate and probably the one they will have most interaction with. It is a legal entity, separate to that of its members. The number of councillors is fixed by the District Council ,but must not be fewer than five (in England). It has powers (what it may do), conferred upon it by statute and must act within those powers. It also has duties, which must be done by law. Its role is one of representation, consultation and delivery of all services needed within its Parish and is accountable to the electorate. It must act in accordance with the 'Nolan Principles' of public life. The Council as a whole can delegate some powers to the proper officer or functions to a committee, but not those pertaining to setting budgets, or approving annual statements and precepts. The Council may decide to set up separate committees with responsibilities for areas of its work, such as planning, estates and staffing. It can also work with outside bodies and organisations for the good of the Parish, such as Highways Authorities.

Clerk

The Clerk is the administrative function of a Parish Council, they provide administrative assistance and professional advice. Parish Councils are required to 'appoint officers as it considers necessary for the proper discharge of its functions'. They are known as the Proper Officer for the Council and this is often (but not always) the Clerk who is under a statutory duty to carry out lawful instructions of the Council, which have been made at a properly convened meeting. The Clerk's role is to act for the council as a whole, not for individual Councillors.

The Chairman

The Chairman of a Parish Council holds office from their election at the annual meeting, until immediately after the election of a chairman at the next annual meeting. They must sign a separate declaration of office as Chairman at the meeting at which they are elected. The role is to be public face of the Council and the interface between the public and the council. The Chair has no individual power to make a decision, but must ensure that all decisions are clear for the Clerk to act on.

The Roles and Responsibilities of a Parish Council (continued)

Councillors

As individuals, councillors must work together to serve the whole parish. They may represent a ward within that parish, depending on the size of the council. They should bring local issues to the attention of the Council and then help it make decisions on behalf of the whole community they represent. Individual Councillors may take on committee roles or additional responsibilities, such as tree warden.

Responsible Finance Officer

Councils are required to arrange for the proper administration of its financial affairs by appointing a Responsible Finance Officer. The Responsible Finance Officer determines the order and content of the accounts and supporting records, subject to the Councils financial regulations and in compliance with the Audit and Accounts Regulations 2015. They will advise on budgets, pay bills and invoices once approved, and pay the employees of the council. In many smaller councils (such as Brede) this role is often combined with that of the Clerk.

Support your Local Businesses

A light-hearted story, to encourage use of local business.

The story of the £50 note

The window cleaner gives it to his wife who buys groceries in the village shop.

The village shop pays the baker for the bread and cakes he supplies to the shop.

The baker, who does like his local pub, uses the £50 note to buy around of drinks for himself and his hard working staff.

The £50 note is going round and round the village keeping the local businesses in funds. This is what using local business does, it keeps the money in the community. Use your local businesses, it makes sense.

Garden designer Kristina Clode has created her wildlife friendly garden at 4 Waterworks Cottages over the last 14 years. Delightful perennial wildflower meadow, pond, wisteria covered pergola and mixed borders packed full of unusual specimens with year-round interest and colour. Sculdown's garden is dominated by a very large wildlife pond formed as a result of iron-ore mining over 100 years ago. The stunning traditional cottage (not open) provides a superb backdrop for several colourful herbaceous borders and poplar trees.

Brede Village Hall

At the end of November 2023, a stalwart of Brede celebrated entering full-time retirement. Lesley Bannister who was for many years the Parish Clerk and latterly the Booking Clerk for Brede Village Hall, has decided to take a well-earned rest and to retire.

Lesley first attended a Brede Parish Council meeting some years ago, hoping to become a councillor, but instead became the Clerk. After many years in that



post, she moved on to Brede Village Hall Committee in the post of Booking Clerk, where she had the task of keeping the available hire slots organised and the various hirers happy.

Everything went well until COVID-19 came along in March 2020. causing severe disruption to everybody's lives and the shutdown of the Hall. Lesley, along with other committed volunteers endeavoured to keep the Hall afloat, fortunately aided by considerable financial assistance from Rother District Council.

Whilst the Hall was empty and unused the Treatment Room and Committee Room were redecorated and refurbished. They now look very smart but, after nearly three years of struggling to keep the Hall going with little regular income, it got to the point where enough was enough. Having previously been the Chairman of the Management Committee, when I occasionally met Lesley, I would ask how things were going. Near the end of October 2022 I bumped into her one day. She told me that she and Jacqui were going to the Parish Council meeting the following Tuesday to tell them that they could no longer cope and the Hall would have to close. Lesley and I spoke again a couple of days later and I said that I would go with them and tell the Council that I would return to my previous post to save the Hall from closing. By the end of that week I had gathered together enough people, all ladies, to form a Management Committee. All are still in post, which brings us to where we are now. My wife Chrissy, who had volunteered to be the Hall Treasurer for a year, has now also retired.

We are fortunate to now have a new Treasurer/Booking Clerk, Penny Williams, who will combine the two roles previously held by Lesley and Chrissy. As a result, service to regular and occasional hirers will continue without interruption.

Lesley has given so much to the parish over the years, and even more to Brede Village Hall, that our acknowledgement of her dedication to the well-being of the parish of Brede is very appropriate.



The children have also taken their learning out into the East Sussex countryside. Our youngest pupils went exploring the beautiful gardens of Great Dixter. Activities included creating leaf crowns, climbing trees and making dens in the woods, all finished off with singing and stories around a campfire with hot pancakes. Key Stage 2 visited the River Ouse and Railway Land Nature Reserve. Guided by the nature reserve team, they investigated the physical and human geography of the river, measuring its flow, collecting data and learning about how the river fits into the wider landscape. It was great to watch these environmentalists of the future at work.

We've also had two significant developments at the school. Firstly, our new library officially opened at the end of January, with ex-pupil Evie Peters cutting the ribbon. Her underwater winning design has been recreated through the generous support of local residents Mr and Mrs Disney, The Rye and Winchelsea Rotary Club, Brede Primary Parent Teacher and Friends Association, and school staff. Congratulations to our Year 5 and 6 children who became the first-ever librarians of the new library. They've been busy stamping, sorting and colour-coding our new books and planning many storytelling and book-related activities for everyone to enjoy. Secondly, the first phase of our new Early Years and Key Stage One garden project is well underway. A new climbing frame is in place, bikes, trikes, and balance toys are on order, with plans to create an insect-friendly wild area and a growing garden shortly. If you're passing, take a look.

Finally, we've had lots of family and community events, too. The children raised an impressive £89.56 for the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal and dressed in spots and Pudsey-inspired outfits for Children in Need. We went on a Magical Christmas Journey when Hedgehog and Rabbits Classes acted out a beautiful story about why we put a star on top of the Christmas tree. There was singing, acting, and excellent narration from our older children, ensuring every performance went with twinkly

fabulousness. Thank you to everyone who came to our annual Starlight Carol Singalong. Seeing our school and the Brede community come together was a joy. As always, the children rose to the occasion, leading the singing and surprising everyone with their BSL-signed ensemble.

Our Sunday service is at 10.30 each week. Holy Communion is once a month. A warm welcome is assured.


