The 8th of May was a solemn and a joyous day in this Parish and throughout the country. Few of us have the opportunity to make widespread improvements to modern life, but how much have we contributed to our local communities?

In the recent Parish Assembly, we considered some of the activities and changes in the Parish in the past year. Thank you to those who attended and participated with your comments and questions. Sections of my report are elsewhere in this Newsletter.

It was a pleasure to mention that we are about to make a significant investment in the Recreation Ground with new play equipment and an all-weather path. These have been largely funded by grants, which allow us to provide more for the community without having to raise the precept. We are very grateful for them.

But many of the things requested in the discussion, like traffic calming measures, cost an amazing amount and, as I've pointed out before, apart from grants which we always apply for if appropriate, there are really only two sources of funds for local projects: the Parish precept to which all householders contribute and money from housing development.

But the voluntary organisations are actually run by quite a small group of people, with the same names occurring several times. Take a look at the organisations mentioned in this Newsletter. Maybe there is another group that you would like to join or, even better, contribute to organising.

So we move into a busy summer season, including the Parish Awards on 26th July. Do come to that; it's always a happy occasion.

Have a great summer: participate, contribute and enjoy!

Annual Parish Meeting Reports

Chair's Report (Summary)

Welcome to Brede Parish Council's Annual Assembly. As Chair of the Council, I'll shall report on the Council's work over the past year.

Council membership has been stable over the year. At the start of the year, Mike Duffield was elected Vice Chair of the Council and Martin Griffiths Chair of Planning, whilst Julie Alison continued with the Recreation Ground and Staffing Committees.

Nearly all Councillors have additional responsibilities, whether that's for Speed Watch, Footpaths, representatives to the Village Hall Management Committee, or various external organisations. So I'd like to thank them all for their hard work and friendly teamwork over the past year.

Also with us, as ever, is our Clerk Tracy Dixon. Tracy does an enormous amount for this Parish. So thank you Tracy for your efficiency and the hours of work you do on our behalf.

In the past 12 months, we've had our customary 10 meetings, plus two extra-ordinary meetings in January. We've also held 12 Planning Meetings. Commenting on planning applications is an important role of a Parish Council. In the course of those 12 meetings, we reviewed 21 applications, ranging from many, small private house extensions, to the revised scheme for houses down the hill from the Old Manor.

Some of you may know that there is currently an application for 27 houses with access from Tillingham View. This will be discussed at a planning meeting on Tuesday the 13th May, at Trinity Methodist Church, on Udimore Road. Like all our meetings, it will be open to the public, so do come along if you have views on that development. But please don't ask questions about it tonight, as Councillors can't comment prior to the planning meeting.

Overall, we recommended approval of 76% of application, which was a similar proportion to last year, though we received fewer applications.

We are frequently asked to comment on various draft policies, mostly from the District and County Councils. Some of these are mighty documents and take a lot of time to digest. But Councillors set about them willingly and methodically on your behalf. Documents that we've reviewed this year have included the District Council Local Plan and proposal for the combined authority.

The year started very pleasantly with our Annual Awards. Congratulations again to those people or organisations who received an award for their contribution to the community, or for their lovely front gardens.

For the gardens, there's a small change this year. In addition to Councillors going round the area, we're encouraging people to nominate their neighbour's front garden if its particularly good. Nominations should be with Tracy by the end of June and the awards afternoon is the 26th July from 2pm. Do come if you can; it's always a happy occasion.

Staying outdoors, we have been working toward new play equipment for the recreation ground. I'm delighted to say that we were successful with two grant applications, one from the National Lottery, and the other from Rother District Council Community Grant Scheme. We are very grateful for those, which allow us to provide more for the community without having to raise the precept.

The money will be spent, firstly, on replacing the gyro-spiral as the bearing is wearing out. We're purchasing an accessible net-twister and the safety surface underneath will be renewed at the same time.

Secondly, we're about to install a fenced off, pre-school play area between the climbing frame and the fitness equipment. We hope that all the new equipment will be in before the school summer



Finally, we'll be adding an all-weather path from the road past the play equipment up to the fitness equipment. There will be some additional seats and passing places at intervals along the length. That will be done in the autumn.

Good news there, but there was some sad news about the trees earlier in the year. The Parish Council has the trees on its land inspected every year and, every five years, we follow best practice by appointing a new professional arborologist. He did his first inspection in October last year. Many of his recommendations were routine: simply cutting back, removing ivy and so on. But three trees were found to have more substantial problems and further extensive tests were carried out.

The two trunks of a tree behind the basketball court were found to be splitting apart with a rotten area at the join. That tree will reduced in size and be fitted with a brace to hold the trunks together. This will make it safe, and should allow it stand for many years to come. A large oak near the fitness equipment is substantially rotten near the base and will be made into another monolith, which will provide a good habitat for wildlife. The work will be completed soon.

But, with great sadness, we were unable to save our largest and oldest tree by the road. Using a system known as tomography, the tree specialist reported that, at 40cm from the ground, the tree was 88% decayed. A probe could be stuck straight into the tree at that level. Also the trunk had a 5m split on one side and was starting to split on the other. Taking all these factors into account and its position on the road and outside the school, he concluded that the tree was high risk and should be felled within 3 months.

The various tree reports, all 118 pages of them, because they go into a lot of detail, are on our website if you want to read them yourself.

Not surprisingly we received many comments. Some were very complimentary, with people thanking us for our care and for taking prompt action. Other people couldn't understand why it was necessary, partly perhaps because we weren't able to publish

the reports right away for reasons of copyright. Other people simply asked questions, and I'd like briefly to run through some of the most common.

"I've looked at the timber on the ground and it doesn't seem to be very rotten". Eer, yes! Those sections were kept precisely because they are in reasonable condition, and we can make something useful from the timber. But there's a missing section of about a metre between the stump and the central trunk that was very rotten and taken away because it was not of any use.

"You said there would be a hollow area in the trunk". That was a reasonable interpretation of the tomography - that's the system of sound waves that was use d to give an image of the inside of the tree. If you search on-line 'What does blue indicate in tree tomography' you'll read something like 'that the wood has lost its structural integrity and may be hollow or dead'. In fact, although there was a hollow area, the blue area was found to be largely full of rotten and crumbly wood. Sorry if we misled anybody, that was certainly not our intention, but, if a big heavy tree like that, in a public place, has lost its structural integrity, it has to go.

"Why didn't you get a second opinion". Simply because the inspection was carried out by a highly qualified person, with 27 years' experience and using the latest specialist equipment. Previous reports had already noted the worsening crack and fungal bodies, and advised careful monitoring. So now to ignore the specialist's advice, could have invalidated our Public Liability Insurance.

"Did you look at other options?" Of course we did, and were able to find good options for two out of the three affected trees. Regrettably no alternative was available for the tree by the road, due to its condition and position.

"What's going to happen to the wildlife". The work was done before the nesting season for birds, and we took a lot of trouble to check for bats that would still have been hibernating. We didn't find any, but it's nice now to have bat boxes in a couple of places around the recreation ground and the second monolith will provide some more wildlife habitats.

Our work with the smaller items continues week in week out. Last year in this presentation, I built up this image of many of the areas we work on. Reporting potholes, street furniture in need of repair, hedges to be trimmed back, seats repaired, dog bins and so on. Incidentally, we'll soon be jet washing those and the swing seats. Early in the year, we had the bus shelter redecorated over the graffiti, an event commemorated on the cover of the July Newsletter.

The Newsletter continues to be published three times a year – one of Tracy's many responsibilities. Thank you to all who contribute about your organisations; we've received some kind comments from local people about the updated layout.

Speed Watch continues, and the local team were joined by Sussex Police for a couple of session in the past year. On a rolling 12 month basis, 418 vehicles were caught, with the fastest at 58mph. In one session, the police were recording speeders at one a minute, which is shocking but, what shocked me more, was that 30% were re-offenders. 418 vehicles caught is not that many, you may say, but that's because the team didn't have many sessions, and they didn't have many sessions because there aren't enough volunteers. So if you care about speeding through the village and can find a couple of hours from time to time, do please speak to Cllr Mark Wey tonight or, for that matter, to any other Cllr.

And, as ever, we commemorate national events. But we're sometimes asked why we don't lay on other things within the parish, for instance the 80th anniversary of VE day tomorrow. The answer is we're a small team with many other duties, but are always pleased to consider grants to other organisations in the village with the capacity to arrange things.

A word about finance. Each Council meeting receives detailed management accounts, bank reconciliations and payments to authorise. The annual accounts are externally audited and, in recently years, with our Clerk's good work, they have passed with flying colours. They're a public document, so you're welcome to have a copy if you wish. Then, once a year, we have to consider the precept, which we keep as low as we can. You'll have seen this graph before, which I've now extended for the new financial year. As you'll see, in recent years, we asked for a considerably lower increase than the general cost of living.

Before closing, I'd like to complement the Village Hall Management Committee. Under the leadership of Rod Came and other capable people. They have achieved an incredible amount in the past couple of years.

They've installed insulation and new lighting, upgraded the central heating, installed new fire doors, purchased new window and stage curtains, repaired the entrance to the drive and so on. Profit has increased from £350 in 2023 to a wonderful £4500 in 2025. So very well done to them. The Village Hall is a great asset to this community.

Overall, it's been another busy year, and we thank you for <u>your</u> support as we continue together for the good of this community.

<u>Devolution and Local Government Reorganisation in East Sussex</u>

Central government has launched plans to devolve power from Whitehall and at the same time reorganise local government. Over the next two to three years, we can expect local government to change in East Sussex.

In December 2024, the three major Councils in Sussex, East Sussex County Council, West Sussex County Council and Brighton & Hove Council, were invited to apply to the Government to become one Strategic Authority with an elected Mayor covering the whole of Sussex including Brighton & Hove. That application was accepted in March 2025, and detailed plans are expected to be submitted and approved by September 2025.

Mayoral Elections are expected to take place in May 2026.

It is also likely that the current two-tier system of local government will be abolished, with Rother District Council and East Sussex County Council ceasing to exist, and being replaced by a single Unitary authority for the whole of the East Sussex area. This should all be finalised and the new Authority in place by April 2028 but with elections for a Shadow Authority being held in May 2027.

Community Speedwatch

To All Broad Oak / Brede Parishioners

I hope your all enjoying the warmer weather now we are almost mid-year into 2025.

As some would have seen, we have now started this year's campaign and worryingly still have the same level of people driving above the speed limit along the A28 in our village.

As I type this, we have conducted two sessions in which we have recorded over 100 offenders in a 3-hour period. Some were repeat offenders; four people were caught twice on the same session when on their return journey.

The main focus for the sessions is still on the A28 Cackle Street, as we are still recording high numbers. Once we have seen a better improvement we will look at attendance in other locations.

Issues that have been reported above the normal speeding offences, have been dangerous driving on the wrong side of the road, and a motorcyclist popping a wheelie at 60mph past us as a clear disregard to us being there, with a vehicle behind recording the incident for their personal gain.

As shared at the Annual Assembly we are actively looking for parishioners who can join our small team to conduct additional sessions, thus driving a higher level of tracking and reporting.

As always, we thank those who take the time to give us a friendly wave, it is appreciated to see what we do is acknowledged as a benefit. Thank You.

Lastly, as a statistic to bear in mind:

A vehicle travelling at 30mph driving at a fixed object will brake sufficiently. A vehicle travelling at 35mph at same distance will hit the object at 8mp. Hitting a person at 8mph will, as we know, cause injuries.

Potholes, Footpaths and other problems,.

Like many of the local parishes, Brede has its problems with potholes, blocked drains, overgrown hedges, disappearing paths and other similar issues.

The Parish Council does its best to report these issues to East Sussex County Council, who are responsible for sorting most of these problems. However, you, the residents are equally able to report these issues, and sometimes the more a problem is reported, the quicker it will be sorted. At a recent meeting with Highways, the Parish Council were asked to ensure that all residents knew how to report these issues.

They can be easily reported online via www.eastsussex.gov.uk. Under the section 'Show more services', you will find links to report problems with roads and also for rights of way, the public footpaths of which there are many in the parish.

Reporting these problems yourself ensures that they are reported quickly and more accurately, as you can use the interactive maps to pinpoint the problem. Pictures can also be uploaded, which help to show the extent of the problems.

Issues which can be reported included:

- Potholes
- Overgrown hedges blocking paths
- Footpath issues such as broken stiles, bridges or gates
- Overgrown road footpaths needing clearing
- Blocked drains
- Flooded drains

You will also find a link to the East Sussex website on the Parish Council website under Parish Information, Useful Links.

Please do report as much as you can, so that the repairs and improvements are competed as quickly as possible. If you are having difficulties, please do let the Clerk know of any issues and help can be given.

Brede Village Hall

At the Annual General Meeting of the village hall committee in March, the trustees and members of the committee said farewell to their retiring chairman, Rod Came. The Power House building is now complete, and the walls and floor have been painted. As you will appreciate, this work has been taking up most of the time that our volunteers spend on site on Saturdays. We are very pleased with the results so far and we can see how much more space we will have to display even more machines in the future. Work is now progressing well to install all the electric compressors inside the building.

We are still hopeful that we will have all this work completed before the winter, although all the equipment will have to undergo thorough testing before we can use the new system on our Open Days. When all the work is complete, we will be able to run all the engines at the same time on every Open Day, without the noise of any diesel compressors.

We would like to thank everyone who has contributed to enable this major project to become a reality. Do come and see how we are progressing.

We continue to open on the first Saturday of every month throughout the year and Bank Holiday Mondays from 10am - 4pm.


